Notice and understand emotions in others. Being aware of other's emotions helps develop empathy and aids in developing friendships.

Our Literacy Coaches' Reading Corner

Adjusting - Within the Text

All readers are asked to read a variety of text throughout their

day. As adults, you might read a novel, an email, a text message, a recipe, or the newspaper. Depending on the type of text being read, a reader adjusts how they read. They might slow down, speed up, skim over, or read for details. They may not read a text from start to finish, but look for the section they need. Readers may reread for understanding, or to remember a specific detail. When talking about text at home you can say:

- Where will you start reading this text?
- Do you need to slow down to help yourself understand?
- How will you read this text?

A helpful tip for our families:

The use of LARGE numbers on BOTH sides of your mailbox makes it much easier for school bus drivers, the fire department, EMS & police to locate your residence. A 4" tall reflective style mailbox number works the best to see a house number from the road-especially in the dark. Driveway reflectors are also helpful as they can be used as a landmark when trying to locate a residence-both in the dark and during the day. Stay away from numbers that are hand painted, dark colored (with no white background on a dark colored mailbox), or are smaller than 4" as they're very difficult to see and read when searching for a house (especially in the dark). This helpful tip can help in an emergency or getting the kids to and from school on a bus!
